Correctional Counseling Program—July and August

- 3 new detainees have entered the program for July and August 2014.
- 4 Fulton County detainees have been discharged successfully recently, and two of the four completed the program on an outpatient basis.
- 2 Defiance County detainees were recently successfully discharged.
- 1 Williams County detainee is presently suspended from the program pending the court's reviews of this detainee due to continued opposition by this youth to actively participate as well as to follow program rules.
- To date we have served 22 detainees, and we have only experienced 3 youth reoffend and return to JDC after completion of the program. There are a total of 4 additional youths from outside the Four-County area (Hardin County), which also participated, and all costs were paid by their court. Grant funds were only utilized for youths from the four counties.
- We have filled all 22 grant funded openings.

The Adolescent Correctional Counseling Program is a cognitive-behavioral program that addresses as well as challenges the moral level of reasoning that is designed to alter how offenders think and how they make their decisions about what is right and wrong. It is also design to reeducate detainees socially, morally, and behaviorally to install appropriate goals, motivations, and values.
